Executive statement



The Gender Scorecard provides statistics on the representation of women in international and regional courts worldwide. The IAWL Gender Scorecard on International Courts and Tribunals assesses the progress of African women judges in these courts.

Men have traditionally dominated the judicial field, resulting in <u>women's underrepresentation in many courts globally</u>. However, in numerous African courts, women judges are making significant strides in accessing leadership positions. An increasing number of African women serve on <u>international benches</u>, with the African Court on Human and Peoples' Rights achieving parity much earlier than long-established courts. At the International Criminal Court (ICC), African women judges constitute the largest group of female judges from all world regions.

<u>International Courts and the African Woman Judge: Unveiled Narratives</u> (Dawuni & Kuenyehia, 2018) is a pioneering book examining the symbolic and substantive representation of African women in international courts and tribunals. Data on the number and diversity of African women in international courts and tribunals can be found on the Institute for African Women in Law's website.

The IAWL <u>Women in Law and Leadership Reports</u> (2023) outline various factors that contribute to the gender gap within judiciaries, such as the lack of support systems and mentorship, as well as negative stereotypes of women. These reports further recommend that for women to overcome these challenges, certain interventions must be considered and implemented, including:

- Advocacy by civil society groups for female nominees,
- Targeted skills development, leadership training, and mentorship,
- Enforce constitutional and legal instruments on equality.

The Gender Scorecard project is essential to IAWL's vision of promoting gender equality in law. Its findings offer insights into gender imbalances in international courts. The scorecard serves as a foundational document for initiatives aimed at advancing women judges in these courts and is an important tool for implementing gender-inclusive strategies in court compositions worldwide. The information for this project was gathered through desktop research, utilizing publicly available data from the courts' websites.
